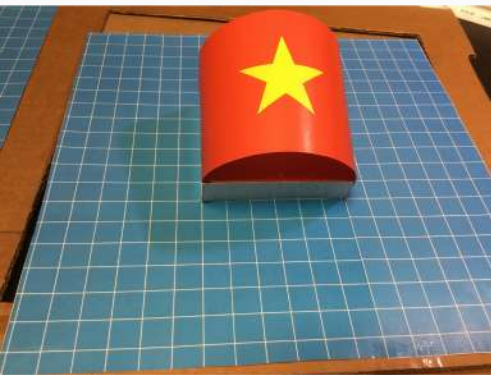
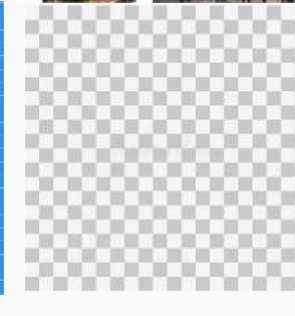
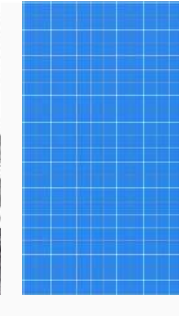
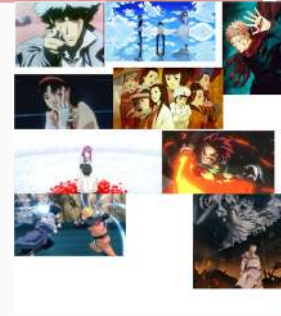
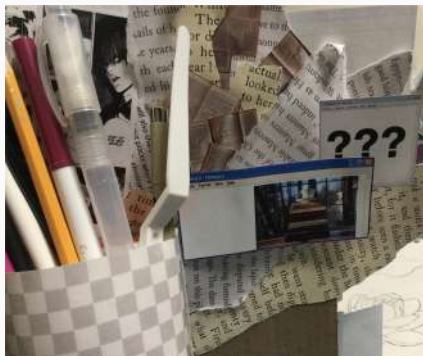


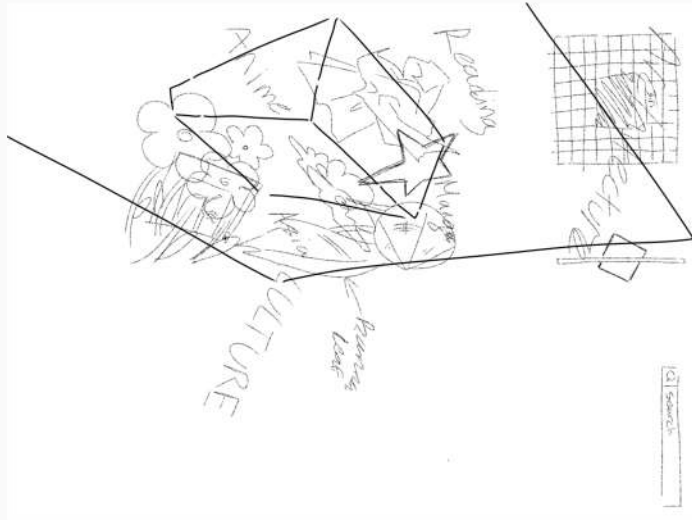
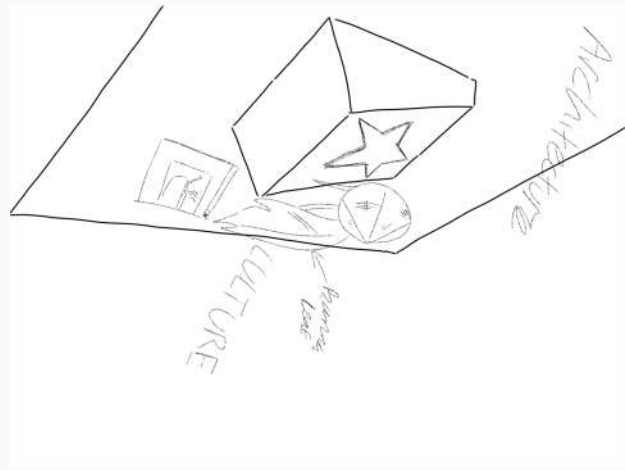
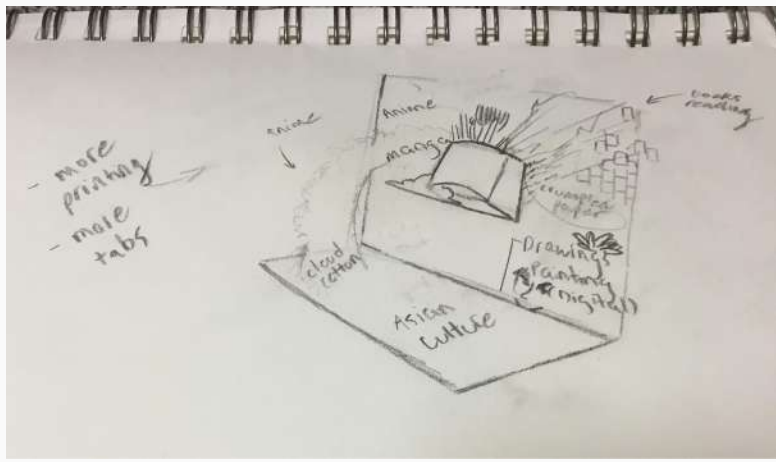
Abstract Self Portrait 3D Model

The abstract self portrait project is a 3D model that is supposed to represent yourself. This project was inspired by Sol LeWitt's autobiography of images in which he documented everyday objects in a grid form that he collected throughout his life. What are the aspects of your life that identifies you, and what are your interests? In this project, I used two sides of this model to represent who I am. The model is a flat piece of cardboard bisecting another piece halfway, creating a vertical stand or an upside down T-cross section. On both sides of the upright cardboard I glued a half cube to give the effect that both sides from the cross section look united, as both sides define me in some way.

The first side represents my identity, my nationality, and my culture in which I grew up in. I am Vietnamese and with this background I grew up with many unique customs that are special to me. There are holidays that are special to us such as Tết, a Vietnamese Lunar New Year, which is celebrated every year with a table of homemade Bánh chưng and Bánh tét with family. I also added my goals for architecture as I am an aspiring architect. I plan to pursue interior design making this my intended career path. The flowers represent my mom who raised me and who has a love for flowers.
